Every parent in Scotland owes an obligation of aliment (the sum paid for maintenance) to his or her children until each child reaches the age of 18, or 25 where a child is undergoing appropriate training or education

S10 (5) of the Family Law (Scotland) Act 1985 specifically provides that benefits under a pension arrangement form part of matrimonial property and since 2000 the orders available to divorcing spouses extended to include pension sharing orders whereby a proportion of one spouses pension rights must be transferred into a pension scheme in the name of the other spouse.
