Webster, in his preface to the 1612 Quarto edition, tells the reader it was a failure when first performed by the Queen Anne's Men at the Red Bull Theatre. Webster's most famous piece *The Duchess of Malfi* (c.1614), however, enjoyed success at the indoor Blackfriars Theatre and later, at the outdoor Globe Theatre. Loosely based on the life of the Duchess of Almafí, Giovanna d'Aragona, Webster's account follows two corrupt brothers as they take revenge on their sister for marrying below her class.
